Overview –The Government is providing additional funding to improve provision of physical education and sport in primary schools.

How we are spending the Sports Premium?

We have 6 key ways that we use Sports premium funding to enhance Sport at Quarry Hill Academy:

1. To provide high quality teaching in lessons through collaborative teaching, planning review and support through the appointment of sports coaches
2. To increase the number of competitive programmes – we aim to ensure high levels of our children participate in competitive interschool competitions as well as competitive inter-house and Catalyst Trust activities across all year groups including opportunities for our SEND children to compete. [Events competed in include: football, netball, cross country, badminton, rounders, dodgeball, Key Steps gymnastics, quad kids, tag rugby, indoor athletics, outdoor athletics, basketball, hockey, table tennis, tennis, dance, golf, boccia, kurling, archery and kwik cricket as well as representing the local authority in National Events]
3. To enhance our schools sports provision with a variety of sports being taught by trained coaches throughout the year, for all key stages including: tag rugby, rounders, badminton, basketball, dodgeball, hockey, table tennis, football, netball, swimming, indoor and outdoor athletics, cross country, tennis, gymnastics, dance, archery, quad kids and kwik cricket with a focus on ensuring all children are water confident and able to swim at least 25 metres. (see table below)
4. To provide specialist coaching to enhance the children’s learning and assisting training of the staff for sustainability
5. To subsidise transport to large events to ensure that as many pupils as possible can attend interschool sporting events from both Key Stages
6. To purchase the equipment needed to be able to deliver a broad and balanced curriculum. For example, by purchasing new gym beams so that all sports have a fair and balanced time taught.
7. To subsidise costs of major sporting events providing enrichment opportunities for children. For example, Wimbledon Tickets.
